LYMINGE CHURCH AS A POSSIBLE SITE FOR A MOBILE PHONE MAST

No decision has yet been made.

But the members of the PCC are continuing to explore the possibilities.

One of the reasons for doing so is because of the financial rewards. We anticipate that the cost for running the church and its ministry this year will be in the region of £52,000 plus an estimated £10,000 towards building repairs. We also estimate our income will be in the region of £42,000, a shortfall of £20,000. Yes we have reserves; yes we could do more fundraising, but there is a limit as to how long our reserves will last and how much people can do.

All our income comes from direct giving by the people who come to church, fundraising (such as St Nicholas' Fayre) and our gift day appeal. In short it will come from the people of this village. We receive no governmental help (as some people think we do.) If there are specific problems with the building we can apply for grants from different voluntary organisations but there is no guarantee we would receive any.

The challenge to keep our church open with its own minister is increasingly coming under threat and the response to our constant plea for more money in order to do so seems to be the only thing some people in our village ever hear from us. We do not want, nor do we enjoy, spending so much time on money issues but it is one of our responsibilities and one which we take seriously.

The members of Lyminge Parochial Church Council are greatly saddened by the reaction of some people in the village to our looking into the possibilities of finding other ways to raise money in order to keep the church open and in good condition.

We want to reassure you that we are listening to what people are saying both by their letters and their comments to us. It is difficult to gauge accurately what the people of a village truly think as it is always the case that those opposing an issue will always make a strong case and those in favour or indifferent say very little. We know there are some against but we also know there are others who are in favour of it, and some feel that jf the village is going to have a phone mast then it would be better for the Church to benefit financially rather than an individual.

In order to try to answer people's questions and concerns (before the PCC makes any decision for or against) we are holding an open evening on Monday 23rd April between 4.00pm and 7.00pm in church. Representatives from the PCC and QS4 (the phone mast company) will be in attendance.

I was privileged to be one of the 26 pilgrims from various local Churches who joined Peter and Vanessa Ashman on the trip to The Holy Land in February. We took in so much information supplied on a daily basis by our guide, Sammie, a Palestinian Christian from East Jerusalem, that my mind is still buzzing trying to digest it all.

What I can say is that I thought it was a pilgrimage of contrasts.
