Not any more as I feel it is the shopkeepers and local residents who are tying up the spaces, so please don't harp on about the car park fees affecting your business. Perhaps the villagers are younger and so do not get sick as often as older residents, hence they do not need to use the chemist as much, or they do not need a blue rinse at the hairdressers. Perhaps we text or use email and " internet more often, or are working, when it is easier and cheaper to use Homebase or Tescos on the way home.

No, I don't want any of these services to close, so leave me a space so that I can call in and bi items that I can get cheaper in town and if anyone is short of 30p I will gladly give it to them.

I have only been in the village for 2 years so it is not my place to spout off, but coming from an area with high vandalism, car crime and burglaries you don't know how lucky you are. I have never slept so well.

#### **Preserving All Our Shops**

New Year is the time we traditionally think about what the future holds for us. Perhaps we should extend those thoughts to our community, in particular what sort of shops and business we want in our villages.

I speak in this article of my thoughts and I should make it clear these are my personal opinions and not endorsed by the Lyminge Association. A quick mental count gives us 15 businesses in Lyminge alone. Unfortunately I'm not in a position to count those we have lost; a butcher, I've been told, and a baker too. I do remember us losing Mayfield Store because we didn't patronise it enough. Some might argue that there wasn't room for 2 grocery stores, but they were at opposite ends of the village. My point, if you haven't already guessed, is if we value our local businesses we must use them otherwise they will close one by one; we don't want to end up with a single general store that sells a bit of everything and not a lot of anything. No one wants a one-stop-shop owned by a large supermarket where profits are sucked out of our community.

All that said, if our shops wish us to be loyal to them by our patronage, they should also act in a way that deserves our loyalty. Perhaps one responsibility is to not engage in practices that are likely to drive one another out of business and so reduce our overall choice. I know there is camaraderie between our shops, perhaps even an unwritten rule that they don't poach one another's core business - I think we as villagers also know in our heart of hearts that is not what our local shops should do.

I have been a little disturbed of late to find that one business is not doing this. One shop is selling products not previously stocked and which is a core product of another of our shops. I spoke to the shop owner in question and he said he was 'catering for passing trade.'

It is not my intention to suggest anyone is being greedy in business because perhaps there are other factors of which I am not aware. But I must admit I am worried about where all this might end. Perhaps if the sale of many health and beauty products was cherry picked from the pharmacy would they be unable to continue trading solely on filling prescriptions?

Correct me if I am wrong but I would like to think our community could support numerous businesses, each a specialist in a particular field. I believe we as consumers have a responsibility to our shops but I also believe they have a responsibility to us. It is up to us to support them so that they don't have to poach on one another's main area of business but it is also up to them to not cherry pick the profitable parts of other business. Support our local shops by offering them your custom for their core business. Don't let them sell you a newspaper if they are supposed to be selling you something else that is named in the title above their shop front. I believe while we are lucky enough to have a variety of businesses we should buy our newspapers from the Newsagent and our milk from the Food Store.

#### Message from The E.Y.E. Chairperson Simon Rosenberg

This Christmas saw the second season finale of Etchinghill Youth Enterprise. Over 30 young people took part in a Casino Royale - James Bond Night. E.Y.E members, their guests and parents enjoyed a night of casino games, target shooting, a non-alcoholic cocktail bar with Bond Movies and music. County Councillor Susan Carey attended to present awards to George Parry, Henry Phillpott and Olivia Hill for best 007 fancy dress. Other prizes on the night went to Tom Boreham and Joe Jackson.

I would like to thank all those who have supported the EYE since we started in our aim to provide an outlet for youth based activities in Etchinghill. The recent season finale was not only a credit to our members but to the parents / grandparents and volunteers who have contributed towards what is now a growing success. I have been approached by villagers in Elham and Brookland who are in the process of setting up a youth club. They wish to learn about The EYE as part of a plan to bring services for young people into their area. I look forward to being able to report more on this as developments are made.

The new season of club nights will commence on Monday 5th February 2007. This break will give the Management Team time to plan ahead for the future. As of the New Year it is my intention to stand down from the day to day operational management of the EYE. My family, home and work commitments have to take primacy over other interests and I do not feel that I will be in a position to give the EYE the support and time it so rightfully deserves. The current Management Team has shown exemplary commitment thus far and we will be actively searching for the right person to take over the coordination of their roles. (Please see advert).

As Chair, I do not wish to detract all involvement from the EYE and hope to remain in a position whereby I can support the group as a whole and influence its long term strategic direction. In the New Year, I will be making enquiries as to the potential of a full / part time employed Youth Worker for our area and hope to work closely with Kent Youth, Kent County Council and other neighbouring groups such as Lyminge Youth Action. I am also investigating ways of linking with a local Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme to enable local young people access to this excellent opportunity for development...watch this space!

So, once again, thank you to each and every one of you who has helped The EYE in 2006. Thank you to the management team for a year of hard work and dedication to the young people of Etchinghill. And a final thank you to the families of our management team for your support with all that has been necessary to ensure success.

Etchinghill Youth Enterprise (EYE) is a youth club based at Etchinghill Village Hall which meets every Monday evening from 1900-2100.
