Letters to the Editor

I have been prompted to write this by events that have happened around me recently.

3 things have happened in one week which has made me think:

- 1. Advert in shop window for information regarding a dog attack, owner of attacked dog wants to know if anyone has information on the dog that attacked hers.
- 2. I found a loose dog running around the street and a woman had shooed it out of her garden because it wasn't hers, straight into the path of me in my car!
- 3. Small child, about 3yrs old, maybe less, at a dog show approaching my dogs and others without asking, mum was at a distance in deep conversation with someone else and not really watching the child.

What with the recent dog on dog attacks and child attacks, our country is becoming an increasingly anti-dog society.

I wish I could take everyone on and change their opinions but alas I can't do it alone. Dogs are getting a very bad press at the moment and I feel provoked as a dog lover, owner and groomer to speak up on their behalf, after all they can't do it themselves!

I do realize that a few years ago there was the school of thought that dogs are dogs and to let them sort themselves out but that's long gone and with so many dogs living in close quarters we can't afford to think like that any more.

Just living where I do in Kent there are my dogs (5), 3 dogs next door, 1 the other side, I next to them and 2 next to us the other way. All of our dogs get along fine. Maybe that's a fluke but maybe it's because we are all experienced owners and have put a lot of work into training and socializing our puppies. Who knows?

There are so many dog training schools in my area that there is just no excuse for bad behavior or bad dog ownership. I can list 4 clubs within half an hours drive from our village.

People please don't be fooled that only puppies can be trained, quite on the contrary the older dogs find fun in training and for the rescued dog it promotes confidence in itself and you as the owner. Training is not just training its bonding and fun for all involved.

People ask me who's to blame in these fights and attacks.... My answer is usually the owner of the dog or carer of the child! I know that's a generalized comment but here's why I say that:

We as humans can make decisions and weigh up the situations and decisions we make. Dogs can't, we domesticated them and put them into these impossible situations they have a natural fight or flight instinct and if they are tied up outside a shop and backed into a corner by a child, they can't run because they are tied up so they do the next best thing: fight!

Who is responsible for keeping that child safe? The mother/father or person left in charge of it that's who. I don't agree with tying dogs up outside shops either.

We have domesticated dogs and encourage the further breeding of fighting breeds, to me it's up to us to protect our dogs, love them, care for them and take responsibility for what they do.

If you know your dogs can be aggressive or "snappy" muzzle it or at least keep it on a decent, well fitting buckle collar and lead. It keeps your dog safe from being put down after it's attacked something or someone and protects everyone else around you!

Breeders and re-homing centers need to be giving out as much info about the breed they sell as possible not just the good stuff: how cute they are and easy to train but if the have a tendency to be shy or nervous, as this can turn to nervous aggression in time if dealt with correctly.

Vets neuter dogs so young; I don't believe that it does as much good as we think. Yes it stops a dog making more babies but it doesn't allow his bones and hormones to settle and him to mature. When we remove these parts at 6 months old our dogs don't yet know who they are. I must say here that this is my view and I know there are many reasons to do it but not "just because". It's a serious operation still involves anesthetic and the risks that that brings. I mention mainly males here but relate this to bitches as well.

People also need to understand that just like humans dogs are born with mental instability, a built in aggression, tumors and pain. These things all cause behavioral problems.

It's not always the dogs' fault it can't be, we breed them, we sell them, we encourage certain behaviors, we domesticated them and we made them what they are today, we can't now turn our back on them, they know no different.

No one can work miracles but there are people/trainers/breeders etc who you can talk to as a new dog owner or an owner of a possible problem dog. Please don't try to go it alone I was always taught that if you don't know ask someone.

She will begin at Rockfish Gap, Virginia and continue south for 470 miles ending in Cherokee, North Carolina. The route will take Tara through the Blue Ridge Mountains (of Virginia, on the trail of the lonesome pine according to Laurel & Hardy!)

FIVE GET FAMOUS IN LYMINGE

The Rude Mechanical Theatre Company will be touring to venues across Southern England again this summer with their new play 'Five Get Famous!'. They will be in Tayne Field, Lyminge on Sunday 8th July. The show will start at 7.30pm and don't forget to bring picnics and wine and have a wonderful evening! Last year's show (The Gold Rush) was included in The Times' Top 3 outdoor shows last summer!

It's, of course, a spoof Enid Blyton style mystery with the Five, Julian, Dick, Anne, George and Timmy the dog, having an exciting adventure! The characters are all played by adults in a white-faced cartoon-ised and very physical style with live original music and songs - and is aimed at adults, although some children will enjoy it too.

It's set in 1940 and the Barnard children have been evacuated to Kirrin Cottage to escape the Blitz. Uncle Quentin is working on a secret project for the Special Operations Executive, while in the village Lady Lurcher is casting for the forthcoming production of Macbeth by the Shakespeare Society. When a toff, Albert Bounder, arrives in the village in a sports car hearts begin to flutter. Simultaneously inexplicable events begin to occur. Menacing snippets from the script are found pinned in unusual places. Lady Lurcher's chickens go missing. Shadowy figures are seen climbing out of Uncle Quentin's study window - and on top of that Cecily, George's older sister, has fallen for the dashing young pilot, 'Bunny' Rabbett, who is about to depart on a secret mission and may end up done in by Jerry. The Five, of course, get to the bottom of it all.

It will be an hilarious satire of village life, the war years and attitudes to class and gender at the time with complex slapstick and physical routines - Enid Blyton meets Miss Marple meets Dad's Army - but it isn't a mere frolic, nor cheap nostalgia. As usual with their plays underneath there will be more to it, a deeply poetic look at childhood, innocence and a kind of Rupert Bear Annual idealised and magical nature - and by implication the loss of all these things in the modern world. It will also have probably the company's most tender love story so far. Don't miss it!
