Our 2nd year as a new committee saw us increase our community involvement so I would like to thank everybody for their hard work and commitment.

We were able to achieve the following this year:

Cultural

- Our seasonal parcel delivery sleigh ride with Father Christmas
- Christmas trees and lights were provided around the Lyminge shops area to light up our dark pre-Christmas nights. This year we hope to co-ordinate a switch on with the shops
- We finally were able to fulfil our long standing promise by abandoning our search for a flower trough and instead order a new bench dedicated to Doug Furminger that Pearl can use on her walks

Sporting and Recreational

- Walking leaflets 3 of the walks begun at the Millennium have been resurrected with the hope of launching at least one leaflet in 2009
- Garage Safaris Spring and Autumn events with one on a Saturday and the other on a Sunday to appeal across the diversity of busy lives have been a good way to sell unwanted possessions and be a good community day

Letters to the Editor

A recent letter to the Lyminge newsletter argued that who owns the Church of St Mary & St Ethelburga is irrelevant and it has been further said that the diocese is the custodian of "the unique and ancient church (building) for future generations". At the same time the church wants to call upon the people of Lyminge and surrounding district to repair the structure.

The church should re-consider its function and role in the life of the individuals and community that make up the Parish of Lyminge & its surrounds before it makes that call. If the church turned outward and embraced the community then I, for one, would consider an annual promise of several hundred pounds - if just a few hundred people were like minded then, in time - end of problem.

The church has to decide if it is to dedicate itself exclusively to the secular requirements of a minority, in which case it is the responsibility of that minority to manage its property. Alternatively, if the church wants the support of Lyminge it has to embrace Lyminge and not expect, in 2008, the village to automatically embrace the church, that way the church could conceivably regain its central & historic role since early Christendom in the life of the village If the Church were more open and receiving then, perhaps, there would be less crime. Today the church building excludes the majority of the "future generations".

- 1. It will only marry practising Christians, others are ejected to the registry office
- 2. Christenings or birth celebrations are limited to practising Christians
- 3. The Church doors are locked and barred for personal meditation & solace.

To be constructive; if the building is to be kept it must be opened, shared, and allow the will of the village be its role in life. If the church wants friends of the church it must surely give cause to potential friends to feel that kinship. Right now the majority, to judge by the limited number of church attendees, are excluded.

If the church is to be solely maintained for the benefit of a handful of worshipers and the occasional wedding and graveyard duty then, so be it, may the building live in peace. If it wants to remain isolated and look inwards I suggest it get on and tries to sell the Church car park for development before someone else does - it would give some immediate significant funds.

A beautiful "old Lady" such as the church cannot be maintained at the expense of the village for the benefit of just a 50 strong congregation, however beautiful it may look on our horizons as we pass it by.

The lush foliage of Nash Hill dominates the view to the east from Tayne Field in summer. It is all privately owned by residents, and by Port Lympne - recently granted planning permission for building by a seemingly very suspicious special vote called by District Councillors, which went against contrary Local Development Policy, a recommendation that it was refused by the Council's own Planning Department and its Arboricultural Office, and plenty of public objections.

In recent years many of the trees on the hill and along the old railway embankment behind Green Banks have be "managed" out of existence. Strictly speaking, "management" means looking after trees and woodland. Apart from that, most trees "need" "management" only when planted in places where there is not enough space for them to grow properly or because man-made structures have been erected too close to them. Unfortunately, this term is commonly misused in situations where people want to justify tree destruction for their own ends: For the sake of extra light to a new patio or trendy decking area; For the heinous crime of "giving too much shade;' Because they misguidedly believe specimens and ornamentals are of more value than native species; Or, particularly illogical, to sustain or create a "view." One resident on Nash Hill has an incomprehensible agenda of her own with regard to controlling and destroying trees in the interests of "management." Recently, having failed to get Port Lympne to remove trees behind my own property (but not adjoining her own), she had the bright idea of getting to them via the energy company responsible for the maintenance of electricity lines on the hill I met their representative when he came to assess the sites affected and was assured that only minimal pruning was required and no trees would need felling. Six months later, two very young lads arrived to do the job and were greeted enthusiastically by one or two residents keen to persuade them to carry out extra work for the sake of their own "management" aims. As a result, many of the trees on the hill have been "butchered" (the word used by Shepway's Arboricultural Officer): The energy company concerned (based several counties from here) had unwittingly, via the Forestry Commission, employed a local company known well to the District Council for causing terrible damage to trees and therefore not included on their list of recommended contractors. Neither the District nor Parish Council was given any warning of this work or opportunity to suggest local tree surgeons. Richard Chubb is raising this issue with the company with the aim of preventing anything like this from being allowed to happen in the future. In the meantime, if you are aware of any activity such as this going on near you, you should contact the Parish Council to monitor the situation.

Each tree heedlessly destroyed results in the permanent annihilation of multiple habitats and the loss of an a which truly belongs to us all, not just to a single land-owner. Trees

sustain house values here: The leafy rural character of the Elham Valley is what makes it a desirable place to live. Many of the trees you see today have lived since long before any of us were born: the legacy of past communities which we hold in trust. If we are fortunate enough to own land which supports them, or is capable of doing so, we should see ourselves not as owners of these great living things but as stewards of them -preserving and increasing them for the benefit of future generations If we cannot appreciate trees, it is arguable that we should reside elsewhere: there are plenty of places which are bare of them already although these are, of course, generally the less enviable areas in which to live. *Mrs Wendy V Priestley, Nash Hill*

Lyminge Heritage Questions and Answers The Captain Swing Tale (Part 1)

This month I thought I would introduce the story about the Captain Swing riots in Lyminge, in 1830 (Q11). This is not the 'facts' but rather the traditional tale that has come down to me since I arrived in the village twenty years ago. A more definitive answer will have to wait for Derek Boughton's Lyminge Historical Society talk on 5th May 2009, which I am looking forward to with eager anticipation. 'Captain Swing' what an emotive name. Since childhood, it has summoned up fascination and slight fear in me, like Dick Turpin or DrSyn. Who was he? What did he do?

The story starts with the end of the Napoleonic Wars in 1815. Boney had been defeated and the country was jubilant. Unfortunately, this had profound effects on the way the poor lived. Bread prices had risen during the war. This was matched by a shortage of farm workers (because many had gone to be soldiers). This shortage meant that that their wages rose and the labourers were able to afford the price rises. After the war, the return of the soldiers resulted in an excess of agricultural labourers. Wages consequently fell and the labourers were being offered shorter and shorter periods of employment. For every farm labourer, there was barely enough money to feed the children and keep a roof over their family's head.

During the 1820's the poor labourers just about managed but towards the end of the decade, there were a series of bad harvests and harsh winters. They had reached breaking point and to cap it all threshing machines were being introduced locally. These machines threshed cereals, such as wheat, so that the grain was separated from the stalk and husk. Previously men using flails had done the job during the winter. It was employment when there was little else in the way of paid work. The threshing machines reduced the job to just a few men.

Because they were expensive, the farmers tended to subcontract the work and the threshing machine came with their own workers. Local farm labourers were not used. No wonder they were getting angry. They feared another bad winter, which beckoned hard times to their cottage doors.

In 1830 Lyminge, a group of men joined allies from throughout the Elham valley to talk about what should be done. Men with names like Spicer, Arnold, Read and Price; all still common surnames today. They may have been partly encouraged by agitators who were trying to encourage revolution as had been seen in France in the same year. Strangers had been noticed travelling the countryside and the tricolour had been seen flying in some parts of the county. In addition, they received sympathy from some of the local landowners. For example, the Lyminge parson, Rev Ralph Price, who was also a prominent farmer, discouraged local farmers from using the new threshing machines because of the severe consequences for the poor. One of their meeting places was in this parson's stables. No one seems to know if this was with his blessing or whether it was used in secret? The stable still stands in Rectory Lane and was part of the Parish Church Hall for many years. At these meetings, the men discussed their options. A lot were in favour of burnings to show the landowners their displeasure, especially because labourers (as non-landowners) had no vote. Others proposed direct attacks on the threshing machines, which would help increase employment. Some suggested attacking ricks and barns in 1830, the parsons & gentry in 1831 and the nobility in 1832!

Understandably, when discussing such radical action, they decided that they needed to protect themselves by having no formal leaders but rather an imaginary one - Captain Swing. The scene was set. What was to happen in this valley? You will have to wait until next month for some answers and Derek's talk for more.

I must apologise to the people I have not contacted yet. Unfortunately, I have been unwell over the summer. Following a spell in hospital, I'm now improving so I will get in touch with you soon. If any one else wants to ask or answer a question or suggest a correction please contact me.
